Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is outstanding

- Children make excellent progress and are very well prepared for school and future learning. Leaders check and assess children's progress in detail and compare the achievements of different groups very successfully to identify and quickly close any gaps in their learning.
- Partnerships with parents and other professionals are remarkably strong and leaders fully understand the importance of creating consistency in children's experiences, both at home and at nursery school. Parents are highly complimentary about the service.
- Staff ensure the setting makes everyone feel included. Children learn to form friendships and respect one another from a young age, valuing the range of backgrounds represented.
- The learning environment is vibrant and inviting. Children are taught extremely well and have lots of independent choice about what resources to use. They are supported exceptionally well by enthusiastic and skilled staff.
- Leaders are highly committed to providing staff with regular support and training to enhance their expertise. For example, all staff and have access to a rich variety of professional development opportunities that ensures children's outstanding outcomes.
- Children enjoy the range of exciting and challenging activities, based on their individual needs and interests. They are happy, confident and typically behave impeccably.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

help the oldest children maintain their excellent progress in learning, particularly during story times.

- The inspector observed teaching and learning inside and outside.
- The inspector spoke to parents to gain their views and experiences of the setting.
- The inspector spoke with children and staff at appropriate times during the inspection and held a meeting with the provider.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector looked at a sample of the children's learning records, staff observations and planning, and a range of policies and documentation, such as suitability of staff and safeguarding procedures.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is outstanding

Children have an exceptional early education. Leaders are extremely reflective about the quality of the setting and have high aspirations for its continuous improvement, seeking the views of others regularly. For example, they gather detailed views from parents, children and visitors to help tailor the service accordingly. Links with other professionals are remarkably strong, supporting each child to make the best possible progress. Safeguarding is effective. All staff have a highly confident knowledge of how to keep children safe and protect them from harm. Leaders implement a variety of well-established policies and procedures to help them maintain excellent organisation. They have an uncompromising attention to children's individual needs, well-being and safety.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

The quality of teaching is exceptionally high. Staff are consistently lively and passionate and have a firm understanding of how children of different ages learn best. Their skilled teaching helps children to develop advanced communication skills that help them to explain their thoughts and ideas. For example, children share stories about their experiences over the summer break, with staff using careful questioning to help extend their ideas. Overall, children are highly engaged both during free-choice play and during adult-led sessions. However, staff are seeking ways of helping some older children remain more focused during story times to maintain their rapid progress. Staff purposely reflect on children's learning in great detail and share this information with parents.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

Children all settle exceptionally quickly and form close bonds with staff, exploring their environment curiously from the day they start. The excellent key-worker systems enable children to gain independence knowing their familiar adult is close by for support. Children are encouraged to develop an understanding of healthy lifestyles. For example, they have nutritious meals and snacks. Staff talk about the importance of eating well and exercising. Children have well-planned opportunities to develop their physical skills. For example, they benefit from daily trips to the park to play imaginative games and activities linked to their learning topics. Staff ensure children's safety is of the highest priority, minimising any potential hazards and aiding their excellent levels of well-being.

Outcomes for children are outstanding

Children are creative and enjoy expressing their enjoyment of music. For example, young children ask to sing songs as they walk to the local park. Older children are highly motivated to learn and develop excellent mark-making skills, an interest in letters and early mathematics skills. For example, children enjoy ordering numerals correctly. All children gain important key skills to make rapid progress for their next stage of learning.

The nursery employs five members of staff to work with the children. Three members of staff hold appropriate early years qualifications and two members of staff are unqualified. The setting receives funding for eligible two-year-olds.
